MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRMAN

2018 is almost like a Tale of Two Cities. While there has been a quicker recovery onshore, the upswing for offshore companies, and service providers, has been slower than many have hoped. However, 2018 may still write a new page for the offshore industry. Commodity prices are slowly ticking upwards and the Trump administration is making good on its promise to unleash the potential of American energy dominance.

The administration released the Draft Proposed Program for the 2019-2024 National OCS Offshore Oil & Gas Leasing Program. While nearly 94% of our nation's offshore resources are off limits to development today, the Draft Proposed Program rejects this shortsighted paradigm, and instead proposes opening up 90% of the U.S. OCS to future exploration and development.



Interior is also reviewing the permits for safe and modern seismic surveys denied during the final days of the Obama administration. Updated seismic data, particularly in the Atlantic where data is more than 30 years old, will allow stakeholders to have a fully informed debate. Furthermore, overly burdensome and ineffective rules are being re-examined, ensuring that the final rules reflect good policy and sound science, not political whims.

Congress is also strengthening American energy dominance. Two key bills passed the House Natural Resources Committee: the SEA Act, which updates the seismic permitting process; and the SECURE American Energy Act, which is an across-the-board modernization of offshore energy law.

Altogether, these are unprecedented, albeit long overdue, opportunities for the offshore energy industry. NOIA is committed to working with the administration and Congress to make the most of these opportunities and unleashing a generation of American energy.

To keep up with the fast-moving energy actions, I invite you to the NOIA 2018 Annual Meeting in Washington, D.C. Held April 11-13, 2018 at the Ritz-Carlton. The meeting features leading experts in policy, economics and national security and allows us to plan our course for this exciting year. As always, it will be a great time to network with fellow executives and long-time friends.

I look forward to seeing you there.

CONGRESSMAN STEVE SCALISE (R-LA) HOUSE MAJORITY WHIP

Congressman Steve Scalise proudly represents the First Congressional District of Louisiana. He currently serves his colleagues as the House Majority Whip, the third highest position for House Republicans.

Scalise is a strong conservative leader who upholds the Constitution, advocating for the principles of fiscal discipline, lower taxes, an all-of-the-above national energy strategy, a robust national defense, and conservative values. Secretary Perry is a veteran of the United States Air Force, a former farmer and rancher, and the longest-serving governor In Texas history, having led the world's 12th-largest economy from 2000 to 2015. He has devoted his adult life to creating prosperity and opportunity for families.

Prior to joining the Administration as Secretary of Energy, Perry served as the 47th Governor of Texas. As Governor of the Lone Star State, Perry championed conservative principles that helped Texas become America's economic engine. Under Perry's leadership, Texas became a national leader for job creation, innovation, and population growth.

Perry's leadership of Texas proved that economic growth and protection of the environment can be achieved simultaneously. While adding population and more than 2.2 million jobs during his tenure, Texas also experienced major reductions in carbon dioxide, sulfur dioxide, and nitrogen oxide emissions. Despite having a rapidly growing population and one of the largest petrochemical refining industries in the world, Texas saw its air quality improve.

An expert on global affairs, renowned for his consistently accurate assessments and forecasts regarding the economic and strategic implications of world events, Vali R. Nasr, Ph.D., is the expert that senior American policy makers, world leaders, and

global corporations turn to for strategic and economic insight on evolving international affairs.

Nasr is the Dean of the Paul H. Nitze School of Advanced International Studies at Johns Hopkins University, a Senior Fellow in foreign policy at the Brookings Institution and a contributor to The New York Times. From 2009 to 2011, he was a professor of international politics at Tufts University's Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy and served as Senior Advisor to the U.S. Special Representative for Afghanistan and Pakistan. Previously, he was a Carnegie Scholar and a Senior Fellow at Harvard University's Kennedy School of Government and an adjunct Senior Fellow for Middle Eastern studies at the Council on Foreign Relations.

A New York Times bestselling author of four books, including "The Dispensable Nation: American Foreign Policy in Retreat", his book "The Shia Revival: How Conflicts within Islam will Shape the Future," contributed to U.S. policy formulated in response to the Arab Spring.

Nasr is also a frequent contributor to leading publications, including Foreign Affairs, Financial Times, The Wall Street Journal and The Washington Post.

A member of the U.S. Department of State's Foreign Affairs Policy Board, Nasr is also a director of the Rockefeller Brothers Fund and the National Democratic Institute.

SCOTT ANGELLE DIRECTOR BUREAU OF SAFETY & ENVIRONMENTAL ENFORCEMENT

Scott A. Angelle is Director, Bureau of Safety and Environmental Enforcement (BSEE), Department of the Interior. He is responsible for promoting safety, protecting the environment and conserving resources through the regulatory oversight and enforcement of



energy industry operations on the U.S. Outer Continental Shelf. He joined the bureau on May 24, 2017, following more than 30 years of reforming agencies and organizations in both the public and private sectors. His career is characterized by a strong desire to achieve results that lead to greater success for the organizations he leads.

Most recently, he served as Commissioner, District II, Louisiana Public Service Commission, an elected position he held from 2013 – 2017. He also served as a member of the Louisiana State University Board of Supervisors and a member of the board at Sunoco Logistics Partners LP.

Angelle began his work in public service in 1988 when he was elected to the St. Martin Parish Police Jury; the youngest person ever selected for the position at age 25. He was elected President of the parish body five years later; also the youngest to hold the position.

In 2004 he was appointed Secretary, Louisiana Department of Natural Resources, a position he held until 2012 under both the Kathleen Blanco and Bobby Jindal gubernatorial administrations. In May of 2010, he was appointed as Interim Lieutenant Governor of Louisiana during the height of the worst oil spill in U.S. history. In November 2010, he returned to the position of Secretary for Natural Resources until resigning to run for Public Service Commissioner.



JOE BALASH
ASSISTANT SECRETARY FOR LANDS
AND MINERALS MANAGEMENT
U.S. DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR

Joe Balash is the Assistant Secretary for Land and Minerals Management for the U.S. Department of the Interior. He is a former Alaska Department of Natural Resources Commissioner where he managed one of the largest single portfolios of land and water

resources in the world, with more than 100 million acres of uplands, 40-60 million acres of submerged lands and tidelands, and more than 500,000 barrels of oil produced daily. Before going to the Department of the Interior, he served as chief of staff for U.S. Sen. Dan Sullivan, R-Alaska.

As Assistant Secretary for Land and Minerals Management, Balash oversees DOI federal agencies including the Bureau of Ocean Energy Management, Bureau of Land Management and Bureau of Safety and Environmental Enforcement.

Balash is a native of North Pole, Alaska and brings more than 19 years of experience in land and natural resource management.

JAMES BENNETT CHIEF OF THE OFFICE OF RENEWABLE ENERGY PROGRAMS BUREAU OF OCEAN ENERGY MANAGEMENT

Jim Bennett is the Chief of the Office of Renewable Energy Programs in the Bureau of Ocean Energy Management (BOEM), US Department of the Interior. Jim has over 35 years of experience in the



environmental and energy arenas serving in a variety of capacities in the Department and other Federal agencies. Prior to becoming the program manager for renewables, Jim led the Division of Environmental Assessment, overseeing BOEM's compliance with the NEPA and other environmental laws focusing on Federal OCS programs, including oil and gas, sand and gravel, and renewable energy. He is a graduate of the Department's Manager Development Program and has earned two Master's degrees — one in Environmental Planning and the other in Computer Systems Management. His experience encompasses events such as the Exxon Valdez and the Deepwater Horizon oil spills, the Cape Wind energy project, and offshore renewable energy activities particularly in the Atlantic.



RICHARD CLARK

Mr. Clark has a Mechanical Engineering Degree from the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga. He launched his career at Shell Offshore in 1979. More than 20 of his 36 years in the energy business have been focused in the deepwater Gulf of Mexico. In 1996, he was one of the founders of Mariner Energy, Inc., serving

as Executive Vice President and a board member.

In 2004, he was a founder of Deep Gulf Energy and has served as President of the company since inception.

WALTER CRUICKSHANK ACTING DIRECTOR BUREAU OF OCEAN ENERGY MANAGEMENT

As Deputy Director, and currently Acting Director of BOEM, Dr. Cruickshank oversees the administration of programs that manage the development of the Nation's offshore resources in an environmentally and economically responsible way. These programs include



leasing, plan administration, environmental studies, National Environmental Policy Act analysis, resource evaluation, economic analysis and the Renewable Energy Program.

Prior to becoming the Deputy Director of BOEM upon its establishment in October 2011, Dr. Cruickshank served as Deputy Director of the Bureau of Ocean Energy Management, Regulation and Enforcement (BOEMRE) and the former MMS since 2002.

Dr. Cruickshank has worked in the Department of the Interior for more than 30 years. He earned a Bachelor of Arts in Geological Sciences from Cornell University and a Doctorate in Mineral Economics from the Pennsylvania State University.



REAR ADMIRAL LINDA L. FAGAN DEPUTY COMMANDANT FOR OPERATIONS, POLICY & CAPABILITIES U.S. COAST GUARD

Rear Admiral Fagan serves as the U. S. Coast Guard Deputy Commandant for Operations, Policy & Capabilities, where she is responsible for establishing and providing operational strategy, policy, capability and resources to meet national priorities for U. S.

Coast Guard missions, programs and services.

Additionally, Rear Admiral Fagan is currently recognized as the Coast Guard's firstever Gold Ancient Trident for being the officer with the longest service record in the Marine Safety Field. In this role, she serves as an advocate and senior advisor for the Service's Prevention workforce.

Rear Admiral Fagan's prior flag officer assignments include service as the First District Commander from May 2014 through May 2016. In this role, she oversaw all Coast Guard missions across eight New England states and over 2,000 miles of Coastline while commanding more than 11,000 active duty, reserve, civilian, and auxiliary personnel. She also previously served as the Deputy Director of Operations for Headquarters, United States Northern Command, advising the NORTHCOM Commander on all operations and providing strategic guidance to plan and execute all NORTHCOM missions.

Rear Admiral Fagan's 31-year career has taken her to all seven continents. Additional operational assignments include service on board the USCGC Polar Star; Marine Inspector positions in Puget Sound, WA, Mobile, AL, and New Orleans, LA; Industry Training with the New Orleans Steamboat Company; Chief of Port Operations at Marine Safety Office Savannah; and Executive Officer-Marine Inspection Office/

LYNNE HACKEDORN

Lynne Hackedorn has extensive experience as an offshore Government Affairs and Land professional. Ms. Hackedorn formerly served as Vice President, Government and Public Affairs at Cobalt International Energy, Inc. Ms. Hackedorn joined Cobalt in April, 2006 as head of Cobalt's Land Department. However, following the Macondo accident in April 2010, Cobalt, along with many other independent offshore



exploration and production companies, faced enormous threats by the critically harmful legislation being proposed in Congress.

Ms. Hackedorn was mobilized to Washington to advocate on Cobalt's behalf with legislators and regulators, and to work with other independent E&P companies in the fight to maintain their license to operate in the Gulf of Mexico. Recognizing the importance of government advocacy, Ms. Hackedorn was officially appointed to the role of Vice President, Government and Public Affairs, where she represented Cobalt in its dealings with federal, state and local governments, as well as industry organizations and groups.

Ms. Hackedorn has 34 years of experience in the oil and gas industry, the majority of which has been concentrated in the Gulf of Mexico. Prior to joining Cobalt, Ms. Hackedorn held various technical and management Land positions throughout her career at companies including Spinnaker Exploration Company, El Paso Production Company, Zilkha Energy Company and ARCO Oil and Gas, where she started her career in 1984. Ms. Hackedorn earned her Bachelor of Science degree in Petroleum Land Management from the University of Houston, graduating Magna Cum Laude, and has served on NOIA's Board of Directors, Executive Committee and as Chair of NOIA's Government Affairs Committee.

ALEJANDRO DE HOZ VICE PRESIDENT, U.S. OFFSHORE WIND AVANGRID RENEWABLES



In her previous role as the Vice President for Government and Legal Affairs, Nikki was responsible for monitoring regulations, directives and initiatives, coordinating IAGC's review and response to such developments, and representing IAGC in joint industry regulatory management efforts.

Before joining IAGC, Nikki worked as the Regulatory and Legal Affairs Manager at the Alaska Oil & Gas Association (AOGA) and previously practiced law in Anchorage, Alaska. Martin's prior legislative experience includes serving as staff to U.S. Senate President Pro Tempore Ted Stevens and as legislative aides to the Alaska State Senate President and Alaska State House Majority Leader.

Dr. McClellan took a lead role in the offshore wind industry after her immersion in the field as Policy Director for Delaware Governor Jack A. Markell. In the years that followed, many of the Steps ignored the conventional wisdom ("Don't quit your day job!"), and although not all of the current members of the Steps are former Capitol Hill staffers, taken together the performers have worked in a total of eighteen Congressional offices and represent 62 years of collective House and Senate staff experience.

Since they began, the Capitol Steps have recorded over 30 albums, including their latest, Orange Is the New Barack. They've been featured on NBC, CBS, ABC, and PBS, and can be heard twice a year on National Public Radio stations nationwide during their Politics Takes a Holiday radio specials.
